Amber Davis – Primary Secretary

As David O. McKay once stated, "Service is spirituality." As an Elder's Quorum, we serve one another on a variety of levels. Being part of a quorum provides an elementary, but important level of service and spirituality. But for the Church, very few of us would ever know or have any interaction with one another. Because of the Church, we not only know each other, but we are familiar with or have opportunity to learn from or be taught by one another, our spouses, and our children. The level of interaction that Church provides because of its emphasis in allowing and encouraging individual members to participate in callings and assignments is many-fold, and thus our understanding of one another is greatly increased. The opportunity to serve in whatever calling or assignment that we have allows us to serve, teach, learn from, and otherwise interact with one another, which provides an often unrecognized support and feeling of belonging that we all rely on as we grow individually and as families.

A key purpose of the quorum is to touch hearts and lives. On an individual level, quorum members serve as examples of good fathers, siblings, children, neighbors and friends. In 2022, various EQ members have inquired as to whether they can minister to a particular individual or family member because they have developed a special relationship with them and they want to add to their relationship through a formal assignment. Such inquiries evidence that a lot of interactions in the ward and between quorum members are happening due to the love and initiative of quorum members. A large part of Elders Quorum meetings are the lessons given. In 2022, approximately 18 different members of the quorum were able to give lessons. The lessons generally included some history of the instructor and his testimony of the gospel, which allowed the following: 1) to provide an opportunity for the quorum to become acquainted with other quorum members in a way that can only happen by observing them, listening to them teach, hearing their own personal stories, and being touched by their testimonies. We have several quorum members who have been divorced, and to hear one or more instructors discuss the challenges of being a divorced member in the church allowed other quorum members to make connections with others, to recognize that they belong in this ward and in this quorum, and to recognize how Heavenly Father blesses them in ways that they may not have recognized. Similar experiences have occurred with mental illnesses, financial struggles, having children stray from the covenant path, addressing questions about the Church that some may struggle with, and many other topics and issues that arise as a lay person shares their experience, their testimony and leads a discussion about an inspired topic shared by a prophet/apostle/general leader of the Church.

On my end, serving in the Church provides me a level of peace and happiness that I am not sure I fully realized until the Covid Coma that occurred. The opportunity to reflect on, to reach out to, to consider assignments for, and to interact with members of the Elders Quorum provides meaning and purpose to my life. Serving with the Elders Quorum helps me to better appreciate God's love for each of us, the common struggles hat we share, the blessings that I enjoy, and the Spirit that attends when testimonies of Heavenly Father, Jesus Christ and Gospel truths are taught and lived.

Primary

The beginning of the year was marked by the combining the Primary and the Young Men and Young Women's organizations of the Beaumont Ward and the Canyon Creek Ward. For Sunday and for midweek activities, the children, youth and shared leaders from both wards came together to learn about our Savior Jesus Christ, our Heavenly Father's Plan for our Salvation and to learn and live the gospel. The Bishopric members and Ward Council felt that the need to fellowship and draw strength from more children and youth outweighed the challenges of combining units. The Primary at that time was under the direction of President Rachel Anderson with Shawn Chamberlain as First Counselor, Shannon Ross as Second Counselor and Amber Davis as Secretary.

In August 2022 a new Presidency was called, sustained and set apart. Cynthia Mathis became President, Kathryn Reed First Counselor, Cindy Smith Second Counselor, and Amber Davis was retained as Secretary. One of the first things that we as the new presidency did was to call each Primary teacher and Leader to have a ministering interview of sorts. The second thing we did was to conduct home visits to each of the children in primary, bringing a treat and our love to each family. These were successful and we got to minister in person to nearly every member of our Primary.


On September 24-25 the Reno Stake held its Stake Conference. At that time there was ward realignment and direction from our Stake leaders to discontinue combining Primary and Mutual for our two wards. New presidencies went into force—with Beaumont retaining Sister Mathis, Sister Smith (now 1st counselor) and Secretary Sister Davis. Samantha Salazar became the new 2st Counselor. As this was right in the middle of preparations for the Primary Program to be held October 23st, both ward presidencies secured permission from their respective Bishoprics to continue with a combined Program which required a combined Sacrament meeting for both wards. There was one practice together for both wards on Saturday morning, but the wards had started meeting separately for the 2 Sundays prior to the program. This was a challenge but also an opportunity to gather in even more children after the realignment changes and come together to share a message of Jesus Christ and His servants on the earth. The children sang and shared their witnesses of Jesus Christ and how prophets bless our lives, both those in ancient times who continue to speak to us through scriptures as well as living prophets and apostles who are the Lord's mouthpieces on earth today. Enclosed is a copy of that program. This was our main event of the year.

Activities were held generally the 2nd Wednesday and the 4th Wednesday of each month and supported the children's individual goals in the children and youth guidebook. There were wonderful activities when ward family history specialists were brought in to help teach skills and introduce the children and the leaders about new and engaging activities within Familysearch.org. The boys and girls combined for an activity in December where they made Christmas gifts for their family members.

As the leader of this ward, I have felt the hand of the Lord over the programs of the church. I have come to understand that every calling in this church is an opportunity to minister and to become more like Jesus Christ. I feel it when I strive to share His light and His love with every nursery child through our veteran teachers. 
